

Next Generation of Collaborative Governance Research

CCG Emerging Scholars Workshop

February 22-24 2019 Tucson, Arizona

Purpose

The Consortium on Collaborative Governance (CCG) is hosting this workshop to advance research on collaborative governance within the public administration field by connecting outstanding emerging scholars with each other and with senior scholars. The workshop will be an opportunity for emerging scholars to receive intensive feedback on work in progress from their peers and senior scholars.

CCG

The CCG is a research partnership focused on advancing the study of how complex, cross-boundary public problems are being addressed by inter-organizational collaborations that often span public, private and non-profit sectors. The CCG partnership began over 10 years ago and now includes five research universities: the University of Arizona School of Government and Public Policy, the University of Washington Daniel J. Evans School of Public Policy and Governance, the University of Southern California Sol Price School of Public Policy, the University of Colorado Denver School of Public Affairs, and the Maxwell School at Syracuse University.

Workshop Description

The Emerging Scholars Workshop is designed to meet the following objectives:

1. Expand the network of senior and junior public affairs scholars focused on advancing research on collaborative governance.
2. Strengthen developing collaborative governance scholarship by pairing faculty members and students for individual feedback and coaching.
3. Expose young collaborative governance scholars to the public affairs job market.

This small, focused workshop will allow new and established collaborative governance scholars to join forces in advancing the next generation of collaborative governance research. Up to 15 new scholars and 15 faculty will participate in the intensive two-day workshop where each new scholar will be paired with a faculty mentor. Faculty from each of the five partner schools will serve as mentors, along with invited faculty from outside the CCG who have expertise in collaborative governance.

The new scholars will present and discuss their papers and be provided 1:1 development guidance by faculty mentors. By the end of the workshop, new scholars will establish valuable relationships with each other and their faculty mentors and identify concrete next-steps for developing their research agendas.

Qualifications

Emerging scholars will be nominated by CCG member faculty and affiliated faculty and asked to submit paper proposals for review by the CCG workshop committee. By emerging scholars, we include PhD students, newly-minted PhDs, post-docs, or assistant professors in the fields of public administration, public management, public affairs, public policy, political science, or sociology. By CG, we mean scholarship focused on cross-boundary collaborative engagement of organizations, networks, and/or stakeholder groups in public policy development, framing, problem solving, management, and/or implementation. We are interested in research that collectively represents a broad range of theoretical perspectives (from organizational theory to

behavioral PA, institutions, and network science, to name a few) and a variety of qualitative, quantitative, and/or mixed methods.

Location and Dates

The Emerging Scholars Workshop will be held February 22-24, 2019, hosted by the University of Arizona's School of Government and Public Policy in beautiful, warm, and sunny Tucson, Arizona. There is no registration fee for the conference, but participants (or their institutions) must cover their own travel and lodging costs.

August 15: Invitation to submit proposals to nominated scholars issued

October 1: Deadline for submissions to workshop committee

November 15: Notification of accepted papers sent out

February 1: Complete papers due to conference website and distributed to discussants
